At the entrance to the road to the Forest Studio, the concert hall of the Monteux School and Music Festival, is a statue dedicated to Pierre Monteux with the word 'Musician' on one side and 'Humanitarian' on the other. It is perhaps not well enough known that the concert receipts from the early years of the School went to fund Maine Coast Memorial Hospital, founded by their great friend Dr. Edward O'Meara, just as the land for the Hancock Grammar School was a Monteux gift to the Town of Hancock. Pierre and Doris were generous people.

Two years ago, the Hancock Historical Society began a search for a new location for its collection, currently crowded upstairs in the Hancock Town Hall and difficult of access. They needed a bigger building and on ground level. When we heard of their struggles to obtain this, we offered them an acre on the 6.4 acre Tamarack Place property that had been gifted to us by Ron Schwizer and Doug Kimmel, and that we have renovated for our office, archives, and accommodation for six musicians. We mean to carry on the Monteux humanitarian legacy. Construction of a new building for the HHS is about to begin.

Sometimes, if not always, what goes around does come around. The Historical Society has welcomed us to rehearse in their large conference room and to exhibit some memorabilia from Pierre's career. We look forward to having the Historical Society as neighbors and we wish them all the best.

Monteux School Safety Improvements

Thanks to Tom Welgoss, Board Treasurer for spearheading these improvements:

The safety and security of students, while attending the Monteux School, are of paramount importance to us. We want our Festival students to have a memorable and rewarding learning experience while they are in Hancock. In this direction, significant steps were taken in 2019 to upgrade the fire protection equipment in all of Monteux' facilities, with help from Morris Fire Protections Services, a very reputable and knowledgeable Maine firm specializing in fire safety and fire protection equipment. Prior to the 2019 Festival, Morris surveyed each of our facilities, and defined what equipment is recommended based on the National Fire Protection Association's Life Safety Code. The recommended equipment included smoke detectors, fire extinguishers, and emergency exit signs and lights. While we are hopeful that these items will never be needed, we firmly recognize that it is prudent to be prepared for unexpected events.

The Monteux Board of Trustees also approved the purchase of Accident Insurance that will be available to all students while attending the New York Winter Workshop and Hancock Summer Festival, at no cost. This insurance is underwritten by the Hartford Insurance Company and includes coverage for accidental death, loss of income, and accident medical expenses (that supplements but does not replace any other medical insurance available to the student). Emergency Travel Assistance coverage is also included. Brochures that detail the benefits and how to access them will be communicated to all students upon acceptance into the program.

Allentown Symphony Conducting Fellowship

In mid-September, I was honored to spend a week as cover conductor and conducting assistant for Diane Wittry, Music Director of the Allentown Symphony Orchestra in Pennsylvania. The week was filled with wonderful activities thoughtfully designed by Diane to give up-and-coming conductors a true and complete view into all the myriad jobs she does as Music Director. We attended board meetings, did a radio interview, met several times regarding music and personnel, and more. I was honored to be witness to her interactions with the musicians, Symphony staff, board members, and audience, and deeply impressed by the thorough and

thoughtful attention Diane gives each one of those roles. Diane truly leaves no individual unattended and is a master of community. The evidence for this was on full display, as the week's activities marked the opening of Diane's 25th season as director of the ASO, and she was fêted accordingly even as she continued to present future season plans, research projects, and promote the week's concert (to say nothing of actually conducting it!).

The program was full of "blue" music - Michael Torke's Bright Blue Music, Jennifer Higdon's blue cathedral, and Johann Strauss, Jr.'s On the Beautiful Blue Danube comprised the first half, while the second half featured Rachmaninoff's Second Piano Concerto with phenom Olga Kern, who dazzled everyone. It was a fun and varied program for me to cover, and on top of my duties of helping Diane balance the ensemble in the hall, I was tasked with tuning the eight wine glasses that produce the bell-like tones at the conclusion of *blue cathedral* and delivering them to the brass players, who uniformly made the same jokes about preferring any variety of alcohol in those glasses... I was warmly and amply hosted all week by longtime board member and Symphony supporter Linda Gardner, who not only provided those wine glasses that I tuned all week but was a wonderful tour guide and advocate for the vibrant community of Allentown.

I am grateful to Diane Wittry for the opportunity to have watched her work. It goes to show that doing your best work all the time is worthwhile, for I believe my "audition" which caused her to invite me to Allentown this season was in fact the Family Concert I performed in Hancock, ME this very summer!

The UAF concerto winner, Shenhong Wei, current violin student at Central Conservatory of China, performed with the UAF Festival Orchestra. UAF is a collaboration with music schools such as New England Conservatory of Music and Columbia University, and partners with the International Chamber Orchestra of America and International League of Artists. UAF provides traditional masterclasses, artistic lectures, private lessons, and opportunities to experience performing with musicians from America and China. By combining music and collaboration, UAF strives to bring young musicians a higher level of performing arts and cultural understanding.

While studying at the 2019 Monteux School and Music Festival, conductor and bassist **William Bewley** accepted a new position as Assistant Orchestra Director at Tomball High School, located in Tomball, Texas. Tomball is a railroad town located 30 miles northwest of Houston. William oversees three string orchestras of varying ability, and an advanced full Symphony Orchestra. He co-directs exactly 100 students at the High School and teaches a class of beginning cello and bass players at one of the school's

feeder middle school programs. In addition, William provides private instruction to all of the bass players in the program. William has enjoyed his time settling into the new position in Tomball, using his skills and knowledge gained at the Monteux School to raise the level of all of his ensembles. William gave his first concert with the Orchestras on Thursday, October 24th.

We are excited to invite Brant Taylor back in 2020 as concerto soloist and coach. Brant performed the Shostakovich Piano Quintet in 2019 and did a terrific orchestra audition workshop for cellists and bassists. He will return to perform the Dvorak Cello Concerto with the Festival Orchestra in July, 2020. Brant writes:

"It was a great pleasure for me to come to Monteux for the first time this past summer. The participants are wonderful musicians and human beings, and the idyllic setting only encourages thoughtful musical dialog and an atmosphere very conducive to artistic growth. It was a quick trip this time for me, but the days were full ones -- observing and playing in orchestra and chamber music rehearsals, a cello master class, and a Wednesday evening concert performance.

The rest of the summer for me included visits to chamber music festivals in Texas and Melbourne, Australia, the International Cello Institute in Minnesota, and also doing my "normal job" as a member of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, playing at our summer home at the Ravinia Festival. I wish the whole Monteux family well, and hope to cross paths with you again soon!"

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
